

SCHOOL BOARD

The Term 4 School Board meeting was held on Monday the 6th of December 2021. **The Agenda included:**

- ⇒ A review of the *School Board Training Module 4* which covers —Monitoring Risk and how the School identifies and manages risks and an overview of the School Risk Plan.
- ⇒ The Term 4 School Business Plan Progress update including the Success and Challenges within our four key focus area:
 - ◇ ASDAN external moderation has been completed and all students in year 10 achieved at least one ASDAN Certificate.
 - ◇ End of year literacy, numeracy and social competency assessments have been completed.
 - ◇ Semester 2 reports have been completed.
 - ◇ Alternative Augmentative Communication has been identified as a focus, the committee has been formed and meetings are underway.
 - ◇ The Department of Education have published a policy addressing the future direction of Sustainability titled 'Caring for Country Together'. It outlines a roadmap and rubric to plot school progress. This has validated the work our school is already doing.
 - ◇ Executive Leadership Team has started initial training in High Performance Team systems.
 - ◇ Finalised the 2021 Health and Wellbeing Operational Plan review, and generated the 2022 plan.
- ⇒ Draft 2022-2025 Strategic Plan was introduced and workshopped.
- ⇒ Therapy review team continue to develop therapy guidelines and policies.
- ⇒ Dates for 2022 School Development Days and School Board Meeting were accepted.



YEAR 7.1

HASS: This term we have learnt about the ancient country of Egypt. Students have really enjoyed learning about Egypt and all of the secrets that it has. They have enjoyed exploring the mummification process and writing their names in hieroglyphics! They have expanded their vocabulary and knowledge, learning about the Egyptians, pharaohs, pyramids, hieroglyphics, papyrus paper, canopic jars, sarcophagi, The Great Sphinx of Giza and so many more exciting things. One of the activities the class undertook was wrapping each other up like mummies. Everyone really enjoyed this fun activity!



SCIENCE: We have been doing a STEM project building a solar energy model. The model is a activity that can be built into six different items. The first items we built was a solar car and a solar windmill. We will continue to build until we create all six! Next is a solar puppy, solar air boat, a solar plane and a solar revolving plane. This has been a challenge as the pieces are quite small and it takes a lot of concentration and focus. The students have been persistent and troubleshooting throughout making these excellent solar energy models.



Jordan, Daniel and Brayden are currently working on project-based learning. They drew a sea creature on wood and used the jigsaw to cut the shape out. The next step is to paint the sea creature and use recycled materials to decorate the item. The boys have done a really great job and all three have enjoyed working in the shed.

YEAR 7.2

ENGLISH: Being the last term of the school year, a big slice of term four has been devoted to assessing what students have learnt throughout the school year in English. For some, term four provided the perfect opportunity for reflection, recapping and consolidation of learning, while others continued to climb the ladder for their English and Literacy developments. These occurred in different ways in our classroom, including intensive MultiLit interventions, public speaking, reading comprehension, story/essay-writing, punctuation exercises, activities on letter names and sounds. We also focused on basic synthetic phonics of Vowel-Consonant (VC) and Consonant-Vowel-Consonant (CVC) words.




MATHS: Mathematics and Numeracy in term four took a similar path as described above for English. The teaching strategies put in place were based on explicit instruction, a multisensory approach and teaching for the transfer of learning, oriented in




make a given value.

the 'from concrete to abstract' philosophy. The contents covered included counting, reading time, multiplication and the metric units of measurement. The class had opportunities to develop their money skills including counting a collection of Australian coins and notes to



SCIENCE: In science we have studied the 'Solar System' including the names of the planets and their distances from the sun. We also learned why the *International Astronomical Union (IAU)* downgraded the status of Pluto in 2006 from being a planet to a dwarf planet. To help with their recollections of the order of the planets' locations away from the Sun the mnemonic "My Very Educated Mother Just Served Us Noodles" ('My' for Mercury, 'Very' for Venus, 'Educated' for Earth, 'Mother' for Mars, 'Just' for Jupiter, 'Served' for Saturn, 'Us' for Uranus and 'Noodles' for Neptune) was one of their highlights in science this term. As part of this study, we created individual models of the Solar System.



TRANSITION

This is promising to see as the aim of the transition program is about rapport building and getting to know their peers by participating in team building activities to help ease any anxieties they may be feeling.



We look forward to welcoming the new Year 7's at the start of 2022.

Our current year 10 students have completed their transition by visiting JTC ESC for 4 days in week 8 of this term. They participated in classroom activities in readiness for next year, along with taster sessions of Cooking, Phys Ed and Art.

Our students are a priority for both schools and staff will continue to ensure that transition is as smooth as possible, making sure students will be warmly welcomed at the start of 2022.

On Friday the 19th of November we combined talents with the choir from Halls Head College to present "This is Us" a showcase of songs where the students sang solo as well as in a group.



YEAR 8/9.1

ENGLISH: This term we have investigated different informative texts and are focusing on 'Information reports'. Each student has written their own information report, and presented this to the class. We learnt about 'Chihuahua's' from Bejay, 'Anthony Davis' from Haydn, and 'Crocodiles' from Dylan to name a few!



MATHS: We have been wowed by everyone's impressive knowledge of 'time'. Our focus has been on not only telling the time, but understanding the value of time and applying this understanding to real world contexts. Daniel and Riley have impressed us with their quick recall of analogue times.



SCIENCE: In class we have covered the curriculum content from the 'Earth and Space Sciences' strand. Specifically, we have learnt that there are three types of rocks- sedimentary, igneous and metamorphic. In particular, how these rocks are formed. We have looked at them under a magnifying glass to practise classifying them.

SOCIAL SKILLS: We have followed the 'You Can Do It' program and looked at anger and what this feeling looks like in our bodies. We have discussed strategies that can be used to support ourselves when feeling angry, and the consequences that might happen when we don't manage those feelings appropriately.



During Literacy time, all of our students have worked incredibly hard on their individual learning goals. I would like to congratulate Damien and Dylan who have demonstrated excellent persistence and commitment, resulting in the completion of their Multi-lit reading program.



In week 7 we visited SciTech, everyone had a great time with the highlight being the train ride and the Top Secret: License to Spy Exhibit. Students are also very excited to be transitioning into Year 10 next year.

YEAR 8/9.2

ENGLISH: Wizz! Bang! Boom! In English this term, we have practiced the use of onomatopoeia words to hook the reader into their short stories. Students have had their creative writing hat on each English lesson and demonstrated their awesome ability to create engaging and interesting stories that take the reader on a fabulous journey. In class we have worked hard on improving our spelling, with everyone acing their spelling tests each Friday!

MATHS: We have focused on improving our ability to tell the time as well as understand the months, seasons and language of time. SCIENCE: This term we have learnt about the three different types of rocks, by participating in investigations which look at the different features and properties of igneous, metamorphic and sedimentary rocks.

We took a sustainable approach by using products that can be repurposed or recycled. We also made some yummy treats including 6 different fudges after conducting a class survey to find our favourite flavours! working hard towards achieving them by the end of the week! So far, everyone has achieved at least one set goal, we are extremely proud of these efforts!

We have continued our weekly class meetings this term where we set our goals for the week and enjoy a morning tea to celebrate our progress. The students have focused on being mature and contributing towards a positive classroom environment before they transition to Years 9 & 10.

Our end of year excursion to Scitech was fantastic; everyone had a great time. We look forward to all the exciting end of year activities when we can celebrate, collaborate and be merry!




YEAR 8/9.3

ENGLISH: This semester in English, we have worked on our grammar skills, developing an understanding of nouns, verbs, adjectives, contractions, etc. These concepts were applied in the construction of sentences, making them more interesting. This helped during weekly creative and persuasive lessons, where students got to develop narratives (horror, comedy and biography) and articles/essays arguing about the topics related to environment, gaming and the future. On top of this, the Year 8/9s watched BTN Newsbreaks and completed related tasks and activities. Some of the students participated in the one on one MutliLit program that targeted reading development.

SCIENCE: The Year 9 students have researched natural disasters such as floods and bush fires in Science this term. They learnt how they were caused and developed safety plans and tips that people could follow if they were ever to find themselves directly affected by one.

SOCIAL SKILLS: Students have continued to set and review weekly goals both as a class and individually. They have continued to participate in the You Can Do It program, further developing their knowledge on the Keys to Success and how to put them into practice in their own lives. Lessons explicitly focused on teaching the skills needed to interact appropriately with their peers.




YEAR 10.2

We are VERY proud of the Year 10's who have had a lot of success in completing their Work Place Learning and their ASDAN requirements.




It is terrific to have the Year 10's out on Thursdays for Community Access. The students have learned how to plan a journey and use public transport

20 YEAR CELEBRATION


